## Use

Free Software can be used for any purpose and is free of restrictions such as licence expiry or geographic limitations

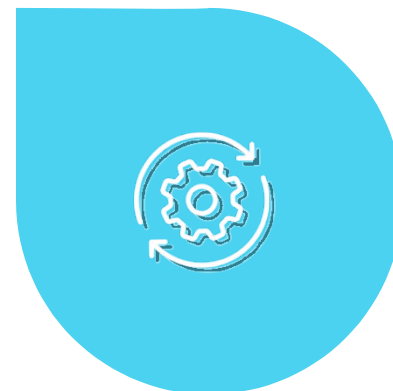


## Study

Free Software and its code can be studied by anyone, without non-disclosure agreements or similar restrictions.

## Share

Free Software can be shared and copied at virtually no cost.



## Improve

Free Software can be modified by anyone, and these improvements can be shared publicly.



**Why you should  
support Free  
Software**



**In order to establish trustworthy systems, public bodies must ensure they have full control over the software and the computer systems at the core of our state digital infrastructure.**



**Public bodies are financed through taxes. They must make sure they spend funds in the most efficient way possible.**



## Tallinn Declaration on eGovernment

We will in our countries:

**make more use of open source solutions and/or open standards when (re)building ICT systems and solutions (among else, to avoid vendor lock-ins), including those developed and/or promoted by EU programmes for interoperability and standardisation, such as ISA 2**



## Tallinn Declaration on eGovernment

We call upon:

**the Commission to consider strengthening the requirements for use of open source solutions and standards when (re)building of ICT systems and solutions takes place with EU funding, including by an appropriate open licence policy – by 2020.**



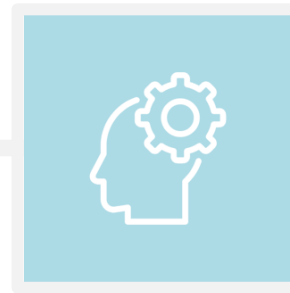


# Why you should support Free Software



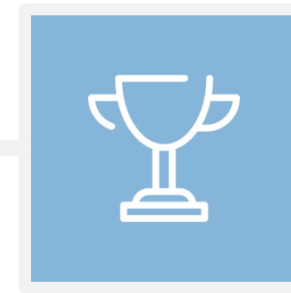
## Regionality

Regional SMEs can become strong partners.



## Autonomy

Free Software helps to develop and maintain tailored software that suits your needs, not just the vendor's business model.



## Efficiency

With transparent processes, others don't have to reinvent the wheel. Major projects can share expertise and costs.



**Governments are amongst the largest purchasers of information technology (IT) goods and services and comprise up to 27% of revenue for software firms.**

**France regulation led to**

**a 0.6% - 5.4% yearly increase in companies that use FS,**

**a 9% - 18% yearly increase in the number of IT-related startups,**

**a 6.6% - 14% yearly increase in the number of individuals employed in IT related jobs,**

**and a 5% - 16% yearly decreases in software related patents.**

Awards 2019**



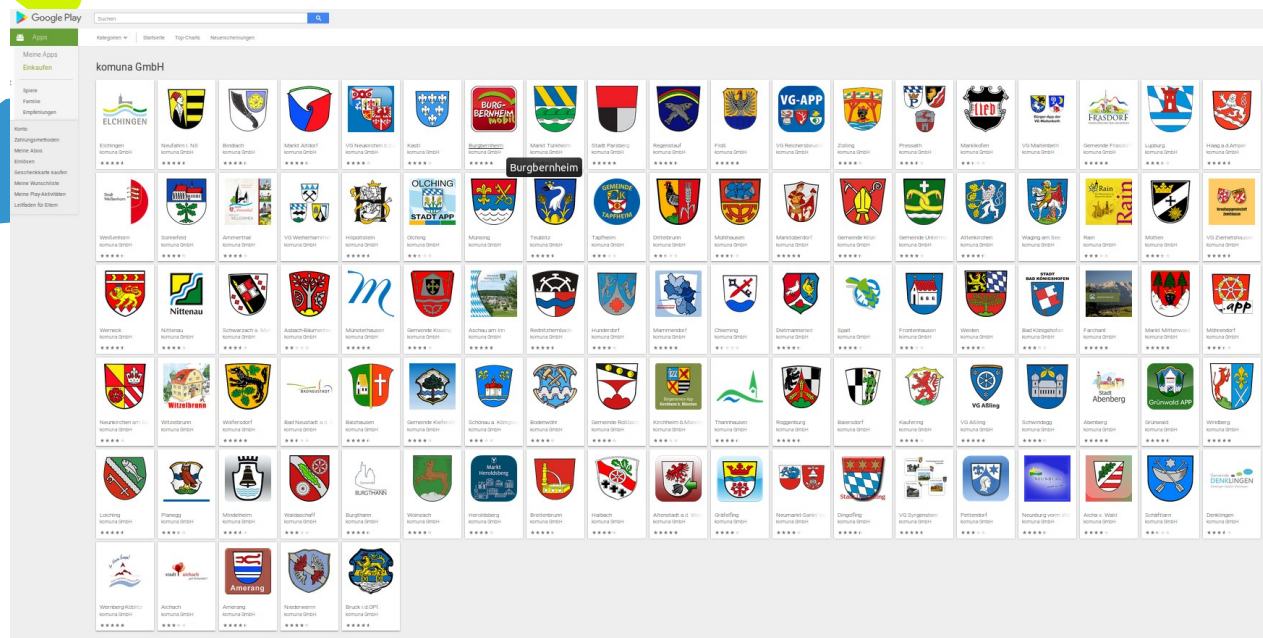
